WHO WE ARE


The North American Decoy Collectors Association is a nonprofit, educational organization incorporated under the laws of the State of Illinois. It invites membership to all persons. The purpose of North American Decoy Collectors is to foster the hobby of decoy collecting by attracting new collectors, seeking out and preserving old decoys, gathering data about carvers and their methods, and holding an annual show for decoy collectors and carvers.

OUR HISTORY

The North American Decoy Collectors Association was started in 1966 by a small group of dedicated decoy collectors as a gathering in Ottawa, Illinois to reconnect, share stories and trade decoys. Since then, the Club has grown to nearly 800 enthusiasts from all over North America and from all walks of life. They write books on collecting, manage auction companies, publish collector magazines, carve world class decoys, calls and collectibles, provide appraisal services, and form a core network of knowledge on sporting collectibles and their history. That humble gathering of collectors in 1966 has grown to become the North American Vintage Decoy and **Sporting Collectibles Show** – the largest show of its kind. The annual show features room-to-room trading, a tabled show and a major decoy auction in addition to a variety of networking events and educational activities including seminars, displays and carving demonstrations.


Educational Seminar: Wednesday

Guyette & Dealer Auction: Wednesday (Preview); Thursday-Friday



Guyette & Deeter will continue the momentum established at last year's show by offering another iconic collection in 2025. The sale will feature the first installment of the Ted and Judy Harmon collection of

outstanding Massachusetts waterfowl and shorebird decoys, many of which were recently on display at the Havre de Grace Museum. The G&D auction will also include a group of early hand-made and Challenge grade Mason and shorebird decoys from the collection of Pete Bennett, a group of rare items from the Don Snyder collection, a selection of unique carvings by John Tax, as well as a variety of Michigan decoys from the collection of Len Carnaghi.

Interested showgoers can get a first look at the sale items at the Preview Reception on Wednesday evening from 5-7pm. On both Thursday and Friday, the auction will begin at 10am with more previewing available both days beginning at 8am. There will be a television monitor on hand in the Grand Ballroom on Friday so that all bidders can keep tabs on the auction progress.



Grand Ballroom Dealer Event: Friday-Saturday

The final segment of our show takes place in the hotel's Grand Ballroom where nearly 300 tables are covered with every kind of sporting collectibles imaginable available for sale. Some of the vendors occupied rooms earlier in the week while others are new with fresh inventory. If you can't find what you're looking for here, you probably can't find it anywhere.

At the same time, there's so much more to experience during this 2-day event. A number of decoy and other sporting collectible displays will be on hand allowing attendees to learn the history of some rare sporting artifacts. There will also be special exhibits by our featured wildlife carver and artist for all to enjoy.

Some other exciting activities of note are:

Free Appraisals are offered in the lobby of the Grand Ballroom both days. It's a wonderful opportunity for folks to learn about and put a value on those items that have been sitting in the attic for far too long. We've seen some very special items come through the doors over the years. Yours could be one, too!

- > Club members are invited to a Members Only "Early Bird" session in the Grand Ballroom on Friday at 11:30am prior to the public admission at 1pm. If you are not already a member, this is a great opportunity to join the NADCA, and get the first look at dealer offerings. You can join online at nadecoycollectors.org, or mail in the Member Application found on page 7 of this newsletter. You can also join at the door.
- Attendees can enter a drawing to win a \$50 voucher to use toward the purchase of any item at the show.

 Drawings are held hourly so everyone has a chance to win.
- Silent Auctions will run continuously during the 2-day event. This is a chance for members to move some inventory and to support the club at the same time. And collectors can likely snag some special items for their collections.

Sporting Collectibles on Display

Each year, the Friday and Saturday Ballroom event offers attendees an opportunity to learn about a variety of rarely seen collectibles. In the past, attendees have enjoyed displays of rare waterfowl and fish decoys, powder tins, shot shell boxes and related items, animal traps and more. This year we are pleased to continue this tradition with two different displays.





Rare Evans Factory Black Ducks

Member John Munson is coordinating a display of rare black ducks made by the Evans Decoy Company. Walter Evans began the Evans Decoy Company in Ladysmith, WI in 1921. He ran a very vibrant business until illness caused him to cease operations in 1932. He offered decoys in three grades: Mammoth, Standard and Competitive. The Competitive model had a rough finish, while the other two versions were sanded smooth and painted with more detail. Evans offered both solid and hollow versions of the Mammoth and Standard decoys.

This display will illustrate these variations using only black ducks, thus eliminating the complexity of paint and other variations from species to species. This promises to be a revealing, close-up examination of these hard to find Evans factory birds. Munson and other Evans collectors will be on hand to answer questions throughout the two-day event. Be sure not to miss this opportunity to examine and learn about these rare decoys.






Lake Poygan Gunning Boxes

With no shortage of fascinating examples, this year attendees will be able to view another group of classic Lake Poygan, Wisconsin gunning boxes. These unique, multi- purpose wooden "totes" were tools of the Wisconsin hunting trade that allowed these early waterfowlers to more easily transport and organize everything they needed for a successful hunt. These boxes represent the epitome of creativity in their design as they often provided a convenient cradle for a shotgun, as well as multiple cubbies for housing all sorts of hunting paraphernalia. Thanks to member Joe LeRoy for making this display happen. Attendees are encouraged to spend some time closely examining these boxes as each one is unique in its design and utility.

FEATURED CARVER EXHIBIT:

Russell Owen




We are excited to celebrate our 2025 featured carver. Russel Owen of Denmark, South Carolina. Russell is a self-taught decoy maker who uses traditional carving techniques and hand tools to create what he refers today as "heirloom-quality gunning rigs." As a young, waterfowl-obsessed boy, Owen carved crude decoys and trained himself on Styrofoam blocks he picked up at the local Tractor Supply store. Later in life, his 14 seasons guiding trout, salmon and sea ducks in Alaska cultivated an admiration for not only the natural world, but also the slow process of observation. He brings those experiences to producing fewer than 100 carvings per year, each one exhibiting the detail and soul that make them unique. We encourage show attendees come to get to know Russell and his outstanding work.





DECOY MAKING DEMONSTRATIONS AND MORE

In addition to the featured carver exhibit, a number of other of today's most talented folk artists will also be showcasing their decoy making skills in the dedicated Contemporary Corner. In addition to offering their work for sale, several of these accomplished makers will demonstrate their carving and painting techniques. These popular demonstrations represent a great learning opportunity for fledgling decoy makers and anyone with an interest in understanding how working decoys are made.



Featured Artist Exhibit

Adam Grimm Returns

Adam Grimm is an internationally known wildlife artist who rose to prominence in 1999 when, at the age of twenty-one, he became the youngest person ever to win the Federal Duck Stamp Competition. Adam used his record setting victory as a stepping-stone to a highly successful wildlife art career, featuring many other notable achievements, including his second Federal Duck Stamp title for 2014-2015. Remarkably, he achieved the "three-peat" in 2024 by winning once again with his beautiful painting of a pair of spectacled eiders entitled "Arctic Watch."

This is a return visit for Adam, as he was our featured artist in 2024, along with his daughter Madison, who clearly has inherited her father's talent. She was youngest winner ever of the Junior Federal Duck Stamp competition when she won the prize at the age of just six years old. Their work was of such interest that Adam has agreed to share his talent with us again in 2025. Be sure to find Adam's beautiful work at the show. You'll be glad you did.

Callmakers Club Gathers in Lombard Again

The Callmakers and Collectors Association of America (CCAA) will once again hold their annual meeting at our show. On Thursday evening, the group conducts a Fancy Call Contest followed by a Pizza Party and Custom Call Auction. On Friday and Saturday, the Fancy Call contest entries and results will be on display in the Grand Ballroom for all to enjoy, and many members will offer their calls for sale. This is a great opportunity to see the fine work by these talented craftsmen and to pick up a call for the collection.



On Saturday, the NADCA will holds its annual member "Favorite" Decoy Contest. Members will bring decoys to compete for the coveted "Best of Show" award. This year's contest will feature black ducks.

As always, there will be two separate contests — one for vintage black duck decoys (made for hunting prior to 1960), and one for contemporary black ducks (made in 1961 or later).

Members should start now planning for which decoys they want to enter – an entry in both categories is encouraged. Pairs count as a single entry. Ted & Judy Harmon:



60 YEARS OF PASSION ON THE CAPE



How It All Began

Ted and Judy's son Steven recently wrote about the life experiences that were the foundation for his dad's life around decoys: "It's hard to say exactly when my father's journey into the decoy collecting world really began." Was it Ted's early visit to Elmer Crowell's workshop with his kindergarten class to watch him make miniatures? Or was it when Ted's father decided to move the family to Cape Cod when Ted was just a young boy, which "laid the foundation for his love of the outdoors, and ultimately his appreciation for the art of the decoy?"

The collecting story of Ted and Judy Harmon of Barnstable, MA on Cape Cod is one of passion, hard work, discovery, luck, and extraordinary joy. It involved family, mentors, friends, and eventually a successful business enterprise. Through it all, their personal collection would become one of the finest groups of Massachusetts decoys ever assembled.

Steven recounts that the Cape Cod his father found was "a place of dirt roads, cranberry bogs, freshwater ponds and extensive salt marshes...an outdoorsman's paradise...full of upland game, and five saltwater basins teem(ing) with oysters, clams, fish and ducks. Ted's youth was spent shellfishing, boating and hunting.

As a young man, he could throw his decoys, shotgun and his trusty lab Bridie into his jeep and hunt any of these places...On one trip

to the Great Marshes (around 1959) in Barnstable, he found a Mason standard grade black duck under an old, dilapidated gunning shack. It was of course devoid of most of its paint...he repainted it and hunted over it for a few years. He kept that bird for almost sixty years and to this day we still have the "cornerstone" of his collection." This single, well-used decoy would eventually lead to a life deeply rooted in collecting and dealing in old wooden waterfowl and shorebird decoys.

The Early Days

Working for his father and starting a family with his new bride Judy didn't allow Ted much time to get terribly serious about collecting. However, this didn't dampen his enthusiasm. Ted found two of the very few collector reference books available at the time -- "The Art of the Decoy: American Bird Carvings" by Adele Earnest and "American Bird Decoys" by Bill Mackey – greatly helping him to learn more about this growing interest. In 1968, he made his first decoy purchase, a bluebill by Charles Black of Bordentown, NJ, and would

soon have upwards of 30 decoys in the collection.

Today Judy laughs when she tells the story of acquiring some of these decoys, but admits that this was probably not so terribly funny at the time. Second son Doug had arrived in 1969, and with two babies in diapers the couple were in dire need of a clothes dryer. So, Ted set off to make the purchase. However, it so happened that there was a Richard Bourne "Rare American Decoys and Bird Carvings" auction on the Cape on that same stormy winter's night. Ted couldn't resist and proceeded to max out the credit card, arriving home with a group of decoys and no dryer! Judy recalls that among these gems was a beautiful pintail by Lloyd Sterling, of Crisfield, MD that was made in the 1940s.

Getting Serious

In 1972, Ted and Judy met Tony Waring, an architect and early collector from Swansea, MA. Tony had an excellent eye for design and style and his influence was instrumental in Ted's education. Tony introduced Ted to a broad network of collectors,

contacts that would be the foundation of his deeper involvement in decoys.

Tony had introduced Ted to Bud Prescott, a neighbor of Tony's and a serious collector. Upon Bud's passing in the early 70's, Ted talked to his widow and negotiated to buy all of his 1200 birds. Funded with a small business loan from a local bank, this was the beginning of Ted and Judy's decoy "business," the buying and selling decoys for profit.

By the mid-70's, third child Amy had arrived and it was a challenging time for the family with three small children and an unproven business. Ted had to be creative in finding decoys and Judy was pulling triple duty as mom, partner, and nurse to earn money. Ted was going to many shows,

bringing birds for sale or trade as well as consigning decoys to auctions. Shows included the Easton Waterfowl Festival, as well as shows on Long Island, in Charleston, Canada and what was then called the Midwest Decoy Show. At the same time, Ted was always on the lookout for the right pieces to squirrel away for his personal collection.

Decoys Unlimited is Born

By the early 1980s, Ted's knowledge and reputation had connected him to a sizeable network of collectors, many of whom would often come to him when they wanted to sell off parts of their collections. Ted would typically refer them to other outlets. However, by 1986 the volume potential was such that Ted

decided to form his own auction company to take advantage of this growing opportunity.

His first auction took place at the ice rink in Easton, MD. Donald Moore was the auctioneer while the Harmons did the catalog and managed the auction. In 1990 Ted was consigned the large and highly regarded collection of George Thompson of New York. This was a significant milestone and changed the trajectory of the business as they moved to two auctions per year requiring a significant increase in marketing and travel commitments. Decoys Unlimited was incorporated and over the next decade the business prospered. Judy retired from nursing to devote her time to family and the business, transitioning the business to a computer-based operation to become more efficient.

Leveraging the Local Network

Ted's reputation as a collector on the Cape had proved to be invaluable even in the early years. There was Earl Peters, a fishman from Martha's Vineyard. In the 1970s, Ted got a call from Earl asking if he wanted to come down to the Falmouth Harbor Marina to see some decoys that Earl had found. Ted jumped on the opportunity and picked up barrels of decoys - brant, bluebills, redheads, black ducks and a number of mergansers.

They smelled of fish since they were in the same barrels Earl used to bring his fish to market. Over the next couple of years, Earl would call several more times until all of the birds he had found in an old barn were gone. This is where most of the Keyes Chadwick decoys in the family's collection had come from.

Ever alert to opportunities, on another occasion Ted saw an ad in the local paper about an auction in Falmouth that included some decoys. He immediately called the

seller to see if he could stop by to just take a look that the birds. She told him that she had just bought them at a Girl Scout sale earlier in the week. There were five excellent Mason Premier grade decoys - three red-breasted drake mergansers and two hen mallards. He suspected that these birds had been part of a large group of Mason decoys rumored to have been stored in crates in a Falmouth sporting goods store after its closing years earlier. Years later after his auction business was formed, a Falmouth doctor consigned a crate of Mason standard grade bluebills that he said had come from that same sporting goods store. So, Ted concluded that the rumor must have been true. What a find!

Over time, Ted's own collecting interests became more focused on Massachusetts waterfowl and shorebird decoys, and he worked his many connections to find a number of great pieces. For instance, there was the Elmer Crowell

"dust jacket" plovers so prominently featured on Bill Mackey's book cover. A splendid group of shorebirds by Melvin Gardner Lawrence came from a "Miss Ruth" Mohr in nearby Saugus, MA.

Building a Legacy

Ted had developed a remarkable eye for art and sculpture and loved the working decoy for its form. He had become a student of the history of decoy making in Massachusetts through continuous exposure to rare and stunning examples through his broad network. Despite dealing with serious health issues, Ted continued running the auction business and feeding his collection with the help of cell phones, computers and the internet.

As a result, the Harmons were able to create a collection of decoys that became one of the finest assemblages of Massachusetts decoys ever held in private hands. Throughout his career Ted would find groups of decoys and put

aside the few rare and unique items for himself. Many were hidden in the dirt floor basement of their home for decades and were rediscovered when the family uncovered them after Ted's passing in 2023.



Priority will be given to returning exhibitors who have held tables in prior years provided your reservation and payment is received by March 15. The table cost remains the same as last year:


